PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Our 2019/20 season ended on a weird note, with our Firsts under the pump in a Grand Final which got chopped halfway through. Ladder position then came into play and Moonee Valley was crowned premier – an unlikely result if we think back to our 8/78 late on Day 2.

That was the prelude to unprecedented lockdowns as the world was enveloped in a coronavirus pandemic, and life as we knew it was turned upside down as people were confined to home for months. Life in general, including sport were put on hold – AFL suspended after one round and going into an 11-week hibernation, and we are still not certain of the likely impacts on our 2020/21 cricket season.

With all that has happened around the world, the start of the 2019/20 season feels so long ago.

It seems almost like ancient history that we took occupation of our purpose-built new \$2.5 million pavilion and won two senior Premierships, with our Fifths joining the Firsts on the podium.

We started the season with a new/old coach in Tony Gleeson, back at Moonee Valley after being at Premier club Carlton for 12 seasons, part of that time as Chairman of Selectors. At the end of the season he had a second First Eleven premiership, to add to the one he coached in 2000/01. Tony then stepped down due to work and home commitments. We start 2020/21 with a new/old coach in Glen Courts – first time as our coach, but a player in the 2000/01 flag.

We had some highs and lows throughout the season.

Probably the saddest was the funeral of much-loved member Heath Webb-Johnson on March 12. More than 50 Moonee Valley players, partners and past players turned out in force at the funeral to demonstrate the impact Heath had made on our Club in just over a dozen years.

Most were wearing the requested Moonee Valley black tops and were part of a guard of honor with raised cricket bats as Heath ended his innings and left the field for one last time.

One of the highlights was our first official big function in the new rooms – a 10-year reunion of our First and Second Eleven Premierships of 2009/10, and the announcement and unveiling of the Teams of the Decade for that period.

We set two new record scores during the season, and fittingly they came from our Premiership teams. The Firsts broke a two-decade old record when they went on a run-fest against Bellbridge at home on November

16, with the 8/466 score beating the previous highest First Eleven total of 439, set in 2000/01 when we were still in the Moreland Moonee Valley Cricket Association turf comp. And that was also a Premiership year.

The 5/363cc score against Maribyrnong Park St Mary's in the semifinal at Ormond Park was the highest-ever score achieved by a Moonee Valley Fifth Eleven. Liam Shaw knocked up 102 not out - his second century for the season, and Shane Chalmers took 5/33 to help rout Maribyrnong for 100. The previous Fifts mark of 7/325 was set in 2009/10 by our B Matting team in the old Moreland Moonee Valley Cricket Association and was led by 170 by Lou Raffaele and 42 from Danny Terzini.

Moonee Valley players scooped the pool for the batting and bowling awards in three grades.

- With the Thirds, Ian Denny won Mercantile's C North batting award with 316 runs @ 39.5, while the evergreen Dean Jukic topped the bowling with 30 wickets @ 9.0.
- Liam Shaw was a runaway batting award winner in the Fifts, with 317 runs @ 74.2. Cassidy Box carried all before him with the ball, snaring 29 wickets @ 10.31.
- Bevan Holder won the Under 16 batting with a fantastic average of 124.5.

Congratulations to new Life Members Peter Golding and Allan Cumming. We have not yet been able to honor them officially as Presentation Night was postponed due to the coronavirus pandemic, but they will be suitably acknowledged at the appropriate time.

It is important to put on record the outstanding contributions of our Committee. Mark Gauci as Vice President, Treasurer Peter Golding and Secretary Michael Ozburn formed a steady executive in my 12th season as President.

Thanks also to Channa DeSilva, Brendan Rhodes, Daniel Phillips, Liam Shaw, Allan Cumming, and Junior Coordinator Peter Pickering for helping keep the Club on an even keel. Thanks to Joshua Gorry for his time on the committee before stepping down.

We've got a strong base to build on as we work towards the 2020/21 season, with our First Eleven being promoted a grade and plans well in place to bring more success. Bring it on!

Initially I should mention why I was interested in coaching the club again. During the previous season I dropped down to Ormond Park to lend a bat to Jack Newman and witnessed a poor attendance at that session. That was not how I knew it to be previously as a player and coach.

The reasons for the seemingly poor level of interest I heard were many and varied but I was still involved at Carlton Cricket Club so that is where my interest and responsibility lay. Towards the end of the 2018/19 season I was approached by Mark Gauci and asked if I was interested in the coaching job for the next season. A meeting with the executive committee was held. I met with the committee and my employers, as adjustments to my work roster had to be made for the role to be workable.

My main aim and purpose for the season ahead was to improve the attendance numbers and quality of the training sessions, therefore ensuring a better preparation for match day.

Pre-season commenced with four indoor sessions at Cutting Edge in Bundoora on Saturday mornings followed by our return to Ormond Park midweek, Sunday morning net sessions at either Royal or Princes Parks, a practice match at Barooga and a centre hard wicket session on AFL grand final day.

I wanted to include as many sessions as possible during the pre-season as players have football, jobs, and family responsibilities during that time. I was reasonably happy with the attendance and quality of training over that period. Apparently, it was a vast improvement on the previous season. After I studied the scorebooks from 2018/19, I ascertained the club's main weakness was fragile batting performances, especially far too many top order batsmen being bowled or lbw. That needed to be improved upon not by major technique changes but a more resolute attitude at training and during matches. Occupy the crease, form partnerships, and bat out the allotted overs!

I am not going to go into a comprehensive match by match review of the season but give a general overview. I felt over the course of the season attitudes and standards at training at times waned but overall, it was up to standard.

The only team over the course of the summer that didn't at some stage vie for the finals was the Fourths – that indicated that across the board we were playing a competitive brand of cricket and at times dominating matches.

The premierships successes of the Firsts and Fifths were earned and celebrated. Whilst the Firsts flag was not conventional it was reward for consistent performances, especially the final round outright victory which secured first place on the ladder. I should mention the Sunbury Cricket Club as they played a great part in the season and can genuinely feel unlucky as they dominated most of the grand final and came away unrewarded.

The Fifths finally triumphed, and their premiership was a result of dominant performances and a great team spirit. Congratulations to Jack Newman, Sam Walker, Liam Shaw, and Dom Rettino who led the two premierships teams so well over the season.

Looking to the future, I feel we have the talent to again have success at the higher grade but cannot stress enough the importance of high levels of effort at training and match preparation.

I will not be coaching again next season as I do not want to again interrupt my work roster but endorse the choice and appointment of Glen Courts for 2020/21. As a former teammate and coach of Buddha, I know the club is in good hands.

Thanks to our captains and team leaders across the season – the aforementioned premierships skippers but also Stephen Ward, Peter Golding, Manu Singh, Brendan Rhodes and Danny Terzini, and those who took up the reins in the Sevens.

I need to thank Charlie Walker and his committee for the opportunity to coach again, the junior program led by Peter Pickering and the junior coaches, Tanya Intagliata for tending to our injured players, a huge thanks to Mark Gauci for recruitment, selection, being a general confidante and supporter for the season, but last thanks to the squad of players who represented the club in 2019/20.

JUNIOR REPORT

Coaching and Players:

There was a big change in the junior ranks this year. For the first time in many years we had two U16 teams, in divisions 1 and 2 of the NWMCA Friday night junior competition, as well as teams in each of the U10, U12 and U14 divisions.

We also had senior players coaching juniors at all levels rather than parents. Channa De Silva and Nick Brelis took responsibility for the U16(1) team, as well as for both U16 teams for training nights. Joshua Gorry and Jack Newman coached the U12s, with Anthony Cafari and Stephen Esmore coaching the U14s. Channa also took on the additional role of coach of the U10s on training nights, with parents looking after match nights.

This is a welcome development for the future of the junior teams, as they are now being coached by current players. These young seniors' players don't have the disadvantage of parents trying to organize other people's children, while still being able to call on parents to help as needed. The level of interest from parents, by turning up to training and matches on Friday nights, also shows the strength of interest in junior cricket among our Moonee Valley CC families.

Overall, the teams had mixed results, with U16(2) making the semi-finals of the competition and U12(4) the quarter finals. U14s suffered from being placed in the wrong grade by the Association, only being placed in the correct grade after Christmas.

There were also individual highlights, with three centuries being scored in the U16s. In addition, we have had many of the U16 and some U14 players representing the Club in senior cricket on weekends, with excellent results – another good sign for the future of MVCC.

On Field Reports:

Under 10s (Channa De Silva)

Coaching the under 10's at training was a lot of fun this season. We started off with roughly 8 or 9 young cricketers and by the time Santa was ringing his bell we were already up to 11 young boys taking on some of MVCC's traditional rivals.

Unfortunately I wasn't able to get to any of the boys' games during the year due to my under 16's commitment, however I was reliably told that the boys acquitted themselves quite well throughout the course of the season, despite a couple of hiccups here and there.

There were several big improvers in the team and a few kids who show enormous talent. Training was always entertaining and always filled with laughter and learning (I hope). I really hope the boys come back next year, and the year after, and the year after that. I'd be very happy to play with any of them in the seniors in the years to come.

Josh Gorry and I took over the under 12's this year. Kath Baker and Maxi Talone both tried out for the under 12's rep sides, although unfortunately we only had one make it. There were about 18 on the under 12's list this year - normally for that age group you could handle it if there are 11 on the field at a time, as always a couple don't play on any given Friday. However, this year the rules changed to have a maximum 9 on field. The most challenging aspect, besides the new rules, was there only being really Josh and myself to coach, making it impossible for Josh and I to split up the large group into two teams and take one side each. This I felt negatively impacted the growth of the under 12's players. Although they did improve, we weren't able to work with them individually as we wanted. However, asshamble,

without the help of a number of parents, this would have been impossible, and the season would have been a shambles.

Under 14(3)s (Stephen Esmore)

The Under 14s had a bit of a mixed season in 2019/20. Due to some administrative issues on the part of the NWMCA, our U14 side was placed into division 1 for the majority of the season, a level the team found to be beyond them at this point in their development. Despite the difficult circumstances, the boys battled away doing their best to stay competitive with their older and more experienced counterparts. In this period some highlights included Matthew and Noah standing up to the grand finalists Youlden Parkville with the bat scoring 17 and 24*, Cullen Morrissy (2/17) dropping the gloves and moving the ball to great effect against Keilor Park,

Thomas Morrissy hitting a chanceless 29* against Maribyrnong Park and Hayagreev at only 11yo willing to take blows on the body from Aberfeldie's opening bowlers in order to help his teammates stay in the contest.

In early December during the competition's round 7, the U14s were appropriately moved to the 3rd division of the competition, the long-awaited change in grade was exactly what the team needed with morale and confidence in the association dropping with every week in the prior grade. The team became much more competitive and the performances reflect that: some of the highlights were Matthew Bocquet and Zac Nilsson anchoring our run scoring in our first and only win of the season hitting 26 apiece with Matthew getting the red ink, Jordy Walsh (2/8), Jack Bastian (2/13) and Jack Shears (2/17) headlining a strong team performance with the ball in the same fixture and Will Hellwig (2/20) showing the fruits of his training against Strathmore Heights.

Ultimately it was a difficult season that tested the boys' overall commitment to playing cricket, but they stayed resolute with all of them completing the season despite only recording the one victory. Beyond the field the parents of the boys, especially Tony Nilsson and Cherie Nimorakiotakis, were an amazing help staying on top of things and keeping the boys interested and committed to playing. It wasn't always easy sailing but the lessons the boys learnt from being put into the fire will serve them well as they continue with their development.

Taking on the coaching role for the U16s in the 2019/2020 season was an exciting and eventful new challenge for myself and head coach Channa DeSilva.

Unfortunately, the boys didn't end up playing finals for this season, however overall seeing the improvement and comradery of the team throughout the year, I was reminded why I still play the game.

One of the major challenges we faced throughout the year was the uneven numbers. Not being able to fully fill 2 sides was something we dealt with all year.

To the credit of the boys, they never once complained about playing with 9 or even 8 blokes against sides that consistently fielded 12-13 every game.

As the season went on the quality of the team's play improved, despite playing against the strongest sides in U16. An end of season highlight was Bevan Holder hitting centuries in each of the last two games.

All in all, I hope that some of the lads will continue their cricket careers at MVCC into purely seniors cricket in the up-coming 2020/2021 season, as we all know there is some genuinely talent amongst the group.

Under 16(2)s (Peter Pickering)

The U16(2) season was full of variety to say the least. The weather gods were often unfavourable, with several matches being cancelled due to heat or rain. The team drew round one, finishing in the dark with the scorers using mobile phones to read the book until the umpire called it off, but also beat two teams with the rain coming down. The team scored a outfight win before Christmas against Flemington CC but lost outright to Pascoe Vale Hadfield. In three matches, the total first inning score was less than 50, but the team also finished 4th for the season in a 10-team competition and made the semi-finals against a team of upper age players.

Individual highlights were many: Riley Walsh making 102no against Flemington batting at 5, Luca McMonagle making 58 opening the batting in the same match, plus Dejan Gilevski 2/6 and 5/2; Nam Nguyen returning to the club after a short stint at Youlden Parkville and scoring 201 runs in only 5 matches, including a career high of 68 against Greenvale and 40 in the semi-final; Dejan taking 4/16 in the semi-final on top of a hat trick for the 6ths; Tomas Morrissy's 198 runs for the season including a top score of 69 against Pascoe Vale CC, plus 9 wickets; Max and Harry Pickering playing in the same team for the first time since U10s and having a ball.

Overall, it was a very enjoyable season, despite the occasional frustration with weather, and I am hopeful that most of the players will be back for their final junior year in 2020-2021.

FINANCIAL SUMMARY

The club reported a profit of \$3,763 for the 2019/20 season. This is a fantastic result given we were in new clubrooms for the first time and we had significant new expenses relating to rent, power and cleaning, while at the same time the committee made a concerted effort to improve the on-field performance of the club with the recruitment of players and coaching staff. The committee succeeded in managing the costs and developed some new revenue streams which will be further developed this year. All members are to be congratulated on this club wide effort to improve and support the new facilities.

The turnaround in income (and expenses) was a mixture of the new clubrooms and moving out of the portables. The income recorded by the club is the highest in our last 10 years (and so were the expenses). During the year we had an array of people help with creating Thursday night meals and plenty who also helped with afternoon teas when Charlie was on one leg – too many to mention. These people all contributed in significant ways to help the club grow this year. The efforts of the de facto bar and canteen stock manager (Jonty Rhodes) in keeping a track of the stocks and making sure we were always well stocked were nothing short of brilliant, while there were two others who assisted quietly with the canteen and bar, Manu Polouse with stocks of Gatorade and snacks and Mitch Britton who came on board with alcohol sourcing and deliveries. Dorrs (Stephen Radford) again were major supporters with their ongoing sponsorship and Bevo, whose cleaning was a significant step-up from the past, and he made coming to the club on a Sunday morning after the night before much less stressful than in the past! And to the committee and captains who collect all the money, run the functions, clean up, lock up, score, make the drinks and sometimes even play cricket – it's a thankless task, but one that makes all of our weekends just a little bit more enjoyable.

While the financial result was pleasing in a time of change, the 20/21 season is shaping up of one of incredible uncertainty and finances may well be tested. Despite this uncertainty, your committee has proposed to maintain fees at current levels.
